Professional networks





About this lesson

To understand the role networking plays within career industries, students will explore job boards, professional social networks, and industry approved accrediting associations, and reflect on the ways these communities can help lead to career opportunities.

Learning objectives

By the end of this lesson, students will:

- explore ways to find employment (e.g. job boards, networking, etc.)
- reflect on the advantages and disadvantages to various work search strategies
- research potential employers and career networks in their community.

Lesson breakdown



Activity 1: Professional networks mindmap

Provide a collaborative space for students to share a range of professional connections, possibly linked to careers they are interested in. To help with brainstorming, provide probing questions (for example, where do professionals in this career: meet-up? look for job opportunities? upgrade their skills? receive accreditation?). Keep this mindmap to build upon in the exit activity.



Activity 2: Xello Lesson: Jobs and employers

In this activity, students will complete the Xello lesson titled **Jobs and employers** to better understand job search strategies and research potential employers in their community.



Activity 3: Professional networks

In this activity, students will research professional organization networks or accrediting associations for three careers of interest and explain how the services they provide support professionals in this industry.



Exit Activity: Professional connections mindmap

Building upon the warm-up activity, have students add the networks they explored in Activity 2 to the mindmap. Then, ask them to draw lines between networks, identifying how they're related (for example, same career field, regulate professional standards, provide career-related training).



Students will need to make sure they have saved 3 careers before starting this lesson. It's also recommended that students complete **Matchmaker** assessment (phase 1) and **Explore career matches** lesson.

Activity 2: Xello Lesson: Jobs and employers





About this activity

In Activity 1, students were provided with a collaborative space to share a range of professional connections, possibly linked to careers they are interested in.

This activity, which includes completing the **Jobs and employers** lesson in Xello, builds on the previous activity to help students better understand job search strategies and research potential employers in their community.

Inquiry prompts

- What do you need when you're looking for a job?
- How do people find jobs?
- What qualities do you think employers look for in a potential employee?
- Do you think it's more important to work in a job you like or for an employer you like?
- What's the hardest part about finding a job?
- What does networking mean? How can it help you find a job?
- As a potential employee, what are you looking for in an employer?

Before you begin

Before diving in with your students:

- 1. Create a copy or download the <u>Jobs and employers slide presentation</u> to use as a helpful teaching aid before and after the Xello lesson.
- 2. Review the slides (including the speaker notes section) for discussion strategies and prompts.
- Update slide 5 of the presentation with your students' Xello sign in format. If you don't know your students' Xello login format check out <u>Sign in to Xello</u> for support.

Teaching strategies

Use the following strategies to set your students up for success:

- 1 Before students start the Xello lesson, engage them in a classroom discussion using a few of the inquiry prompts from the **Warm up** activity slide of the Jobs and employers slide presentation, or choose your own.
- 2 Help your students log in to their Xello account. Project your screen as you model how to navigate to the lesson using your demo student account. From the student dashboard, click on a lesson to get started. If the lesson you want isn't visible, access it by selecting **View all lessons** below the lessons shown.
- 3 Students finished early? Encourage your students to review the mindmap from Activity 1 to prepare for the next activity.
- 4 Once all students have completed the Xello lesson, return to the <u>Jobs and</u>
 <u>employers slide presentation</u> to have them revisit their answers to the inquiry
 prompts you posed at the beginning of class.
- Classroom discussion strategy: Round robin: Lead a round robin style
